We have had fewer, **yet more intentional events** - a cookout on frat court, a relaxing Greek Getaway at the beach, an all-Greek service project, and a free Thanksgiving Dinner. A five student Follow-Up team has been

intentionally engaging and encouraging the community, which has freed the Vision Team up to plan these events well and spiritually guide the community.

Greeks Provide Christmas Joy for Children Worldwide

This year Greek IMPACT took the lead mobilizing Greek students at Carolina to serve others this holiday season. We challenged Greeks to make Christmas Shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child – a ministry aimed at providing Christmas presents to children in impoverished countries around the world – and students responded. We served hot chocolate and cookies to fraternity and sorority students outside of Delta Kappa Epsilon and collected 225 shoeboxes and over \$1,300 to ship the boxes across the globe. An average shoebox costs \$10 to make, so over \$3,000 was raised for Operation Christmas Child this year. This was a great opportunity to take the lead in a Greek-wide charity and for our leaders to step up and lead their peers.

Greek Impact has been an amazing journey this semester in expanding my walk with Christ and trying to become fully alive. One of my proudest moments was this past month with our involvement in Operation Christmas Child. We set up as a collecting agent for all the Greek houses to bring their boxes too. We had quite an event with hot chocolate, cookies, and good fellowship between many houses. We collected over 175 boxes from houses all over the Greek system. It was a truly moving experience to see all the different houses come together for an exciting cause.

So we purchased the birds (a 22-pounder and 3 13-pounders), stuffing, potatoes, cider, sweet potato pie and ingredients for deviled eggs, green bean casse- role, cranberry compote and Kim's famous ooey gooey pumpkin bars - and the Shepley's and students went to work on preparing the Feast.



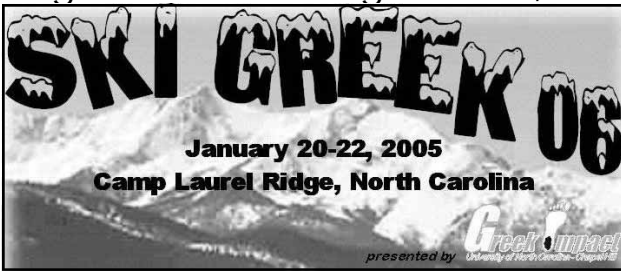
By 5PM Monday evening perhaps the most impressive collection of student prepared food had arrived at the house of a senior student -

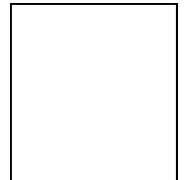
